DELVER MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT 2022-2023





MARC T. MINOR



Faith is currently the keyboardist and praise dance choreographer at New Beginnings Church. She has played an intricate role in the Youth Conservation Interest Group programs since she was in middle school.

The speaker for the Annual meeting was the Reverend Willie Nelson, III, native of Richmond, Virginia and Pastor of Worship Arts at Ousley United Methodist Church in Lithonia, Georgia. He is a 2014 graduate of the Morehouse School of Religion at the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, Georgia, with a dual Master of Divinity degree and a Master of Arts degree in Church Music. In 1999, Rev. Nelson was the first male recipient of The Delver Woman's Club Scholarship. He delivered an inspirational message; challenging us to put faith in action and to persevere in faith by helping others and to serve. He reminded us that every change in the world starts with one person. Thank you, Rev. Nelson, for an excellent message.

Rosa Oden, Chair, Remembrance Committee was honored as the 2022 Delver Woman of the Year. Rosa grew up in Mayesville, South Carolina. She graduated from Eastern High School in 1958. She was married to the late Jesse N. Oden and they had two children, Jesse Cedric and Vivian Michelle.

In 1963, Rosa graduated from Johnson C. University, in Charlotte, North Carolina with a Bachelor's Degree in French and Psychology. She was very active in the Civil Rights Movement of the 60's. In 1967, Rosa moved to North Highland, California with her husband, Jesse. She was hired as a teacher of English and Reading at Rio Linda Junior High School. One unforgettable moment was when Senator Robert Kennedy came to campaign in the area on June 5, 1968. Rosa was able to meet and shake hands with him. What excitement that later turned into sadness. Senator Kennedy was assassinated that night and died on June 6.

Returning to Richmond in 1972, Rosa was hired at Harry F. Byrd Middle School in Henrico County to teach French and Reading. In 1979, she received a Master of Arts degree in Education/Guidance Counseling from Virginia Commonwealth University and was hired as a Counselor at Varina High School. While at Varina, Rosa took seven students to Europe; visiting England, crossing the English Channel to visit France. She is a member of First United Presbyterian Church and serves as an Elder. In addition, she is a member of the United Presbyterian Women, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. and Parliamentary Law Club of Richmond. Rosa enjoys traveling with her daughter, Vivian. In 2014, they visited the US Open in New York, and in 2019, they went to the NBA finals in Toronto Canada. They have visited several other places.

A member of the Delver Woman's Club for twenty years, Rosa has also served as First Vice President, Chair of the Youth Conservation Interest Group, member of the Membership Committee, Assistant Chaplain and Chair of the Telephone Committee for the 75th Anniversary.




OTHER UPDATES

Commendations from Virginia political leaders for her hard work and dedicated service was acknowledged via a resolution in 2018. The "dynamo" as described on WTVR- Channel 6, reported she chaired seven community organizations at one time while married and rearing six

children. Needless to say, she devoted her time tirelessly for social change however, she fostered the same love for her church, family and friends. Because she credited others along her journey, one quote during her television interview in 2018 that continues to hold the shimmer of the summer moon, "...again you need support and help. No man is alone. You have to do things together."
